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Love Knows No Bounds

On January 29, 2021, Slovenia Post issued a €0.69 stamp which they call “A Greeting Card for Love of All Kinds”. This heart-shaped stamp in the colours of the LGBTQ+ flag shows two birds in mid-flight.

In its bulletin, Slovenia Post reminds us all that “The modern world is heterogeneous and full of variety in every area. This is actually also true of various periods in history that saw people express their amorous inclinations and relationships between the sexes in different ways. Different societies responded differently to these relationships between individuals and groups.

“Today we try to be ever more understanding of different ways of life and relationship that are an inherent part of the society we live in. An attitude of tolerance is developing that focusses on respect and the acceptance of difference. In some parts of the world and some social environments, conditions are still far from being ideal and we are still witnessing cases of rejection, intolerance and other phenomena that attempt to push homosexual love and the whole LGBT movement to the margins of society, or even out of it altogether.



For this reason, the stamp design in the characteristic colours of the LGBT flag aims to draw attention to our tolerant encounters with human relationships of different kinds.”



It is heartening to see stamp agencies reflect the growing tolerance in society as a whole. It is not that long ago that homosexual love was banned and criminalized. Slovenia Post acknowledges that there is still far too much prejudice and intolerance. Stamps such as this help us take small steps as we seek to promote a more tolerant and healthy attitude towards difference.

The FDC for this issue shows a heart in the lower left corner in the same colours. The inscription above the heart exclaims, “Love knows no bounds.” Truer words were never spoken.

GLHS Website Mobile Upgrade Complete

The GLHS website has been upgraded to make viewing friendlier to those who use mobile devices. Smart phone users will find it is no longer necessary to finger zoom pages to a larger size in order to select journals for viewing or to click on links. The presentation will vary according to whether a smart phone, tablet, laptop, or desktop is used to access the website, with the experience changing very little for those using larger screen size devices.

In addition to the mobile friendly upgrade, the “links” page has been expanded from a dozen to almost 400 philatelic sites on the internet. Included are links to about 200 postal administrations and around 135 philatelic organizations. Members finding their favorite philatelic links missing, especially ones helpful for LGBTQ-related research, are encouraged contact me at the addresses listed on the website.

Even more stamp images have been added to the website, including one for a 2013 Uruguay stamp that appears so far to be the first depiction of the Rainbow Flag on a regular postage stamp. Thanks to Yme Woensdregt for mailing this stamp to me

for scanning and posting. John Stefanek continues to provide stamps for imaging on the website, with more than three dozen added in the past few weeks.

There are now over 350 LGBTQ related stamp and souvenir sheet images published on the website, but more are always welcome. One advantage of displaying images on the website is they are presented in a much more organized manner than postings of Facebook. Also wanted are LGBTQ related covers and postmarks.

Because there are so many topical stamps being produced these days for the philatelic market, I prefer to have stamps depicted that somehow relate to the country of issue, unless there is no other way to depict the subject matter. So far, most of the images have been provided by myself, John Stefanek and Joe Petronie. I hope to add your name to the list of contributors.

Don’t forget that dues can now be paid on the website in the “Members” section. An option to make a donation, in addition to the normal \$10 dues is provided. If you don’t have or forget the password for the “Members” section, Lisa Foster will be happy to provide it to you.

Brenda Fassie

Brenda Fassie was South Africa's first black pop star, selling millions of albums during her two-decade career. She was known and loved for her outrageousness. Tabloid stories told of her drug use, bisexuality, and diva-sized tantrums.

She shocked people all her life.

Brenda Nokuzola Fassie was born on 3 November 1964 in the Cape Town township of Langa, South Africa. By age five, she was already singing to earn money from tourists. She moved to Soweto and sang lead for Brenda and the Big Dudes. Her 1983 debut single, "Weekend Special," got international air play.

She had a son by one of the Big Dudes musicians, and in 1989, married businessman Nhlanhla Mbambo. The marriage was annulled a year later.

Young South Africans loved her lyrics that reflected the realities of apartheid. She became the Queen of Kwaito, a pulsating pop that exploded out of the townships in the 1990s. Her 1998 solo album, *Memeza (Shout)*, was the first South African album to go platinum on the first day of release. She won three Kora Awards, including one

for best female artist, and won five South African Music Awards.

According to Brenda, she spent the early 1990s in a cocaine haze until the overdose death of her lesbian lover, Poppy Sihlahla, in 1995. Over generous, she has been broke many times and has been arrested for nonpayment of debts.

Brenda made her American debut in 2001, complete with a "wardrobe malfunction." It was not well-received. She continued to battle drugs and alcohol, with visits to rehab clinics.

As she lay in a cocaine-induced coma near death, the tabloids reported squabbles between her lover, gospel singer Gloria Chaka, and her family. Brenda Fassie died on 9 May 2004.

Self Service Kiosk Stamps

Darrell Ertzberger sent his dues using a curious stamp. When asked about it, Darrell wrote the following:



The "stamp" that I used came from the self-service kiosk at the post office. https://about.usps.com/news/state-releases/pa/2014/pa_2014_1211.htm There is one of these machines in my local post office. Usually they load in new labels at Christmas that match the new Christmas stamps.

Scott Specialized lists these; the numbers have a CVP prefix. I usually buy a couple of sheets of the Christmas ones to use on mail, because it seems many folks do not see these, although I think the kiosks are pretty common in urban and suburban post offices.

I used to see sheets offered in quantity on eBay and it was probably part of a credit card theft scheme. Dishonest people would steal or clone a credit card, use it at the post office machine to buy as many stamp sheets as it allowed (\$500 worth, I think), and then sell the stamps at discount on eBay or flea market to convert them into cash. I just looked at eBay and only saw one such lot. There is also one from a legit dealer offering a past year Christmas sheet. Maybe the USPS Inspectors cracked down on eBay and the scheme.



Luis Caballero was one of the most significant Latin American painters of the twentieth century. For the last 25 years of his life, the nude male figure was his only subject. His large-scale compositions expressed the interaction of sensuality with aggression and even death.

Luis Caballero Holguín was born on 27 August 1945 in Bogotá, Colombia, and was raised in a conservative Catholic household. He “devised powerful erotic fantasies about the beautiful figures of Christ and male saints displayed in the churches of Bogotá.” He studied art at the Universidad de los Andes in Bogotá before studying at the Académie de la Grande Chaumière in Paris. While in the French capital, he “began indulging his seemingly inexhaustible sexual appetites with many anonymous sexual encounters.”

Luis taught painting and drawing back at the Universidad de los Andes. In 1968, his *Cámara del amor* (*Chamber of Love*) won First Prize at the First Ibero-American Biennial of Medellín.

In 1969, he emigrated to Paris, where he studied the works of Michelangelo, Caravaggio, Delacroix, Gericault, and other artists for energetically posed nude males engaged in brave actions. He began to devote his own works to large-scale male nudes depicted from various points of view, energized by flexed musculature. He sought to reveal the intense eroticism of aggressively masculine figures. Luis said, “The two cornerstones of my work...pain and pleasure, are anchored in religion. ... In short, I would like to unite Eros and Thanatos.”

Luis Caballero returned to Bogotá just before he died as a result of AIDS on 19 June 1995.

Dale Smith volunteered to assist in getting a cancellation.


We need artists to submit designs for a cancel and for show covers/cachets.

Reflections

Welcome to 2021.

The challenges of 2020 hopefully are in the rear-view mirror – permanently.

For the first time in 14 months there will be a stamp bourse in the Central Florida area on April 3rd. The show will be totally COVID-19 compliant. We as stamp collectors perform a similar function as we endeavor to protect our little pieces of paper for future generations to cherish. We are curators.

The lack of social activity outside of our household – has been difficult, however the time did allow me to accomplish some philatelic tasks that have been long put off. I now have a better handle on my holdings in my specialty collections – and know where to find the material! You may wonder if my philatelic reference library has been indexed.... well, that answer is ‘no’. I still must scan through more than four hundred books to find (or not find) what I am looking for. One day that might change.

The events of the last 14 months have been a learning experience for everyone. I can only hope that as 2021 continues that the glimmer of hope continues to improve and allow for the resumption of our desires to be philatelic social animals again -- as in-person club meetings and shows begin to awaken from a long slumber. 

Unlike most people, I put a selfie of my first self-haircut on a Picture Postage stamp.

National Poodle Skirt Day Picture Postage Stamp

There was no National Poodle Skirt Day until I declared one. In this age, anyone can declare a "national day" for anything. I chose October 26, which is the birthday of Juli Lynne Charlot, the

creator of the poodle skirt. In 1947, Ms. Charlot, an actress, made a skirt to wear to a Christmas party. It had Christmas-themed appliques on it. She made another skirt with three dachshunds appliqued to it. She soon started a trend of dog-themed skirts, though any subject could be on a "poodle skirt".

Yes, that's me in the poodle skirt, which is the costume that I wore for Halloween in 2019. Halloween is a big event in Toronto, and the city closes half a mile of a downtown street, Church Street, so people can walk around and party outdoors in costume. That stretch of Church Street is also coincidentally (?) the Church-Wellesley Village, the historic LGBTQ+ neighbourhood of town (though anyone and everyone shows up there on Halloween or anytime, really). Unfortunately, the Halloween celebration was cancelled in 2020 due to the pandemic. I was feeling nostalgic for the good old Halloweens, so I put this picture on a Picture Postage stamp.

Both covers have a private, unofficial postmark that I made as a proposal to Canada Post to create a counterpart to the U.S. Mailer's Postmark Permit. Canada Post did not reply to my proposal, but it got some publicity in *Canadian Stamp News*.

Members are encouraged to enter exhibits.



North America



Sexual orientation among First Nation groups in North America allowed for a third sex, the berdache. However, times are different; berdache may or may not be any, or many, of the alternate sexualities of today's society.

Spanish explorers in US Southwest in 1500s described male/female individuals. In the US Great Plains in 1600s the French made contact in over 20 tribes with berdache, men who preferred women's work and/or clothes. The reverse, women who preferred men's roles were found only among the Cheyenne.

These individuals took on a gender role different than male or female, and most had a spiritual place in their societies. A recent designation may be "two-spirits." They are known in many Native American groups, but what this indicates about members in pre-Columbian times can only be assumed. Among current Zapotecs in Oaxaca, Mexico similar individuals are called muxe.

Nevertheless, in the eyes of the Spanish conquistadors Mexico had homosexuals.

MAYA - c. 200 BC - 1000 AD on Yucatan peninsula and south. There are male same sex wall paintings in Guatemala and phallus rock statues at Uxmal. The Maya god Chin is said to have introduced homosexuality.

TOTONAC - c. 300 - 1520 AD in area near Veracruz on Gulf of Mexico. Allied with Cortes in 1520, Xicomocoatl, leader of the Totonac was reported by Cortes' Catholic priests to be homosexual with a retinue of young men. The culture was also said to include cannibals and cross-dressers.

AZTECS (Mexico) c. 1300-1520 AD centered in present day Mexico and extended from there. On the one hand, homosexuality was punishable. On the other it occurred. As an aggressive society, the Aztecs victors in war expressed power over prisoners with anal penetration. There is an Aztec (Nahuatl) word for lesbian. Xochipilli, in retrospect, is suggested now to be an Aztec god of same-sex activity.



Malouf and McCullough

Journeys and Outings is a case study in author David Malouf's closet which investigates the role of the closet and coming out in his early works. The exploration of the now openly gay Australian writer David Malouf's childhood home at 12 Edmondstone Street, to the is-he-isn't-he conjectures of Johnno, to the literary leap from the closet represented by an imaginary life.

Malouf's first published books were collections of poetry, "Interiors" in *Four Poets* (1962), *Bicycle and Other Poems* (1970) and *Neighbours in a Thicket Poems* (1974). Poets Kenneth Slessor and Wallace Stevens were both influential to Malouf finding his own voice. Malouf is one of six novelists featured on the latest Australian Legends set of stamps. Australia Post released the stamps on January 21, 2010. He is joined by Peter Carey, Bryce Courtenay, Thomas Kenally, Colleen McCullough and Tim Winton - a group of Australia's most prolific, most popular, most awarded authors.



Colleen McCullough is perhaps best known in the US for *The Thorn Birds*. It is a 1977 best-selling novel adapted as a television mini-series in 1983. During its television run March 27-30, it became the United States' second highest rated mini-series of all time with stars such as Richard Chamberlain and Barbara Stanwyck.



Chamberlain was outed by the French women's magazine, *Nous Deux*, in December 1989. However, it was not until 2003 at the age of 69 that he came out in his autobiography, *Shattered Love*.

During her 60-year career, Stanwyck was known as a consummate and versatile professional with a strong screen presence. She was a favorite of directors such as Cecil B. DeMille, Fritz Lang and Frank Capra. After a short stint as a stage actress, she made 85 films in 38 years in Hollywood, then turned to television. Stanwyck married twice, the first time to vaudevillian Frank Fay and the second time to Robert Taylor. Although she rebuffed questions about her sexuality or her marriages, many observers of the Hollywood scene believed that neither Stanwyck nor either of her husbands were heterosexual.

Rose Valland By Laurent GAUCHON from France

I am a stamp collector and FDC and more specifically about LGBT rights and personalities around the world. I would like to share with you this stamp published on October 01, 2018 about a great lady of the Resistance during the Second World War : Rose Valland.



At the Institute of Art and Archeology of the University of Paris, Rose Valland obtained, in the 1930s, three higher education certificates in the history of modern art, medieval archeology, and archeology Greek, as well as a thesis at the renowned Ecole du Louvre. Then, she became a "volunteer attaché" to the museum of foreign paintings and sculptures of the National Gallery of the Jeu de Paume in the Tuileries.

From October 30, 1940, at the request of the Director of the National Museums, she remained active at the Jeu de Paume Museum, officially as a conservation attaché. But she is, unofficially, responsible for reporting on the actions of the Germans who have just requisitioned the museum to store the works of art looted from private collectors.

For four years, she keeps track of the movements, provenance and destination of the works of art. She wrote dozens of files in a scrupulous manner, deciphered German carbon papers in the museum's dustbins, listened to the conversations of Nazi officials. (she spoke German very well).

She provides essential information to the Resistance on the trains that transport the works of art, so that these convoys are spared by the resistance. In the fall of 1944, she communicated

to the Allies the names of the German and Austrian warehouses of works of art in order to avoid bombardments, to secure them and to facilitate the recovery of them.

From May 1, 1945, she became a "fine arts officer" in the 1st French Army, head of the Service for the restoration of works of art - Artistic recovery. She has the rank of captain. In administrative residence in Berlin, she is authorized to travel to the various Allied occupation zones, British, American and Soviet, from where she repatriates a large number of works.

Between 1945 and 1954, she participated in the repatriation of more than 60,000 works and various objects looted from public institutions and persecuted Jewish families.

On her return to Paris in March 1952, she returned to the administration of the Museums of France, as curator of the National Museums. She becomes head of the Service for the Protection of Works of Art. Her heroic action during the war and the post-war period earned her numerous French and foreign decorations. She was made a Knight of the Legion of Honor, Commander of Arts and Letters, and obtained the French Resistance Medal. The United States presented her with the Medal of Freedom. She was made an Officer of the Order of Merit of the Federal Republic of Germany.


During the post-war years, Rose Valland met Joyce Heer (1917-1977), secretary-interpreter at the United States Embassy, who became her partner until her death. The two women share an apartment rue de Navarre in the 5th arrondissement of Paris. Rose Valland reserves a place for her at his side in the family vault.

Rose Valland retired in 1968 and died in 1980 at the age of 81. She is buried with her partner Joyce Heer.

I hope you have been interested in the magnificent "character" of Rose Valland and that you will speak about the stamp issued in her honor.


APS Summer Seminar 2021

New Issues

By John P. Stefanek

On 22 March 2021, France released a stamp commemorating the Centenary of the Death of **Camille Saint-Saëns**.

On 12 March 2021, Turkey released a stamp commemorating the Centenary of the National Anthem of the Republic of Turkey, featuring **Mustafa Kemal Atatürk**.

On 8 March 2021, France released a stamp commemorating International Women's Day, featuring **Simone de Beauvoir (1908-1986)**.

She was born in Paris and was the youngest person ever to pass the philosophy *agrégation*, a highly competitive postgraduate exam. She achieved a score second only to Jean-Paul Sartre, with whom she would have a long-term open relationship. Simone had relationships with both men and women, including Bianca Lamblin. She taught at the lycée level until she could support herself with her own writings. Her first novel, *She Came to Stay*, dealt with a *ménage à trois*. Her most famous work, *The Second Sex*, was published in 1949. She first articulated what has become known as the sex-gender distinction, and she demonstrated how women have been defined in relation to men. She won France's highest literary award, the *Prix Goncourt*, in 1954. It was announced in 2020 that a previously unpublished novel would be published in 2021, with a translation by Lauren Elkin, dealing with a "passionate and tragic" real life friendship Simone had as a young girl with Elisabeth "Zaza" Lacoïn.



On 8 March 2021, Hungary released a stamp commemorating the 550th Anniversary of the Birth of **Albrecht Dürer**.

On 5 March 2021, Serbia released two stamps celebrating Easter, including one stamp featuring **John the Apostle**.

On 4 March 2021, Ireland released a stamp commemorating the Bicentenary of the Birth of Lady Jane Wilde, mother of **Oscar Wilde**.

On 27 February 2021, Estonia released a stamp commemorating the Centenary of the Estonian Medical Association, featuring the Rod of **Asclepius**.

On 26 February 2021, Isle of Man released six

stamps commemorating the 95th Birthday of Queen Elizabeth II, including one stamp design based on a photo by **Cecil Beaton** featuring her in a dress designed by **Norman Hartnell**.

On 26 February 2021, Monaco released a stamp commemorating the Centenary of the Death of **Camille Saint-Saëns**.

On 24 February 2021, Austria released a stamp celebrating Old Masters, featuring *Theseus with Ariadne and Phaedre*.

On 9 February 2021, Gibraltar released six stamps commemorating the 95th Birthday of Queen Elizabeth II, including one stamp featuring her in a dress designed by **Norman Hartnell**.

On 8 February 2021, France released a stamp commemorating **Jean-Michel Basquiat (1960-1988)**. He was born in New York City and first achieved fame as part of SAMO, a graffiti duo. He was the youngest to participate in *documenta* in Kassel, Germany, and the youngest to exhibit at the Whitney Biennial. He was close to Andy Warhol and was openly bisexual.



On 3 February 2021, New Zealand released a stamp commemorating the 35th Anniversary of the Passage of the Homosexual Law Reform Bill, featuring the **Progress Pride Flag** created by **Daniel Quasar**. He is a Portland-based designer/artist, musician, and avid gamer who graduated from Pacific Northwest College of Art. "Background: LGBTQ 6 full sized color stripes representing life (red), healing (orange), sunlight (yellow), nature (green), harmony/peace (blue), and spirit (purple/violet). Hoist:



PRIDE 2021 \$140 NEW ZEALAND

5 half sized stripes representing trans and non-binary individuals (light blue, light pink, white), marginalized POC communities (brown, black), as well as those living with AIDS and the stigma and prejudice surrounding them, and those who have been lost to the disease (black)."

On 1 February 2021, Liberia released a miniature sheet and a souvenir sheet commemorating the Bicentenary of the Birth of **Richard Francis Burton**.

On 29 January 2021, Slovenia released a stamp celebrating Greetings. According to Pošta Slovenije, “In some parts of the world and in some social environments, conditions are still far from being ideal and we are still witnessing cases of rejection, intolerance and other phenomena that attempt to push **homosexual love** and

the whole LGBT movement to the margins of society, or even out of it altogether. For this reason, the stamp design in the characteristic colours of the LGBT flag aims to draw attention to our tolerant encounters with human relationships of different kinds.”

On 22 January 2021, Japan released a miniature sheet commemorating Record of Nature, including one stamp featuring narcissi (**Narcissus**).

On 21 January 2021, Ireland released a stamp commemorating the Centenary of the Birth of **Patrick Scott (1921-2014)**. He was born in Kilbriann, County Cork, and trained as an architect. He had his first exhibition in 1944 and became a full-time artist starting in 1960. He was best known for his gold paintings, abstracts of geometrical forms incorporating gold leaf. In 2013, he wed his companion of 30 years, Eric Pearce.

On 15 January 2021, The Gambia released a miniature sheet commemorating the 75th Anniversary of the United Nations, including one stamp featuring **Eleanor Roosevelt**.

On 15 January 2021, The Gambia released a miniature sheet commemorating the 400th Anniversary of the *Mayflower* Pilgrims, including one stamp featuring **William Bradford**.



On 15 January 2021, Japan released two miniature sheets celebrating Moomins, created by **Tove Jansson**.

On 6 January 2021, Turkey released two souvenir sheets commemorating the Centenary of National Independence, featuring **Mustafa Kemal Atatürk**.

On 29 December 2020, Brazil released a miniature sheet commemorating MERCOSUR – Fashion, including one stamp with a design based on a photo by **Nino Muñoz (born 1977)**. He was born in Chile and at age seven moved to Canada with his family. He started photo assisting in New York City and spent the last two decades as a successful fashion and celebrity photographer. He currently lives in Los Angeles with his husband and three dogs.



On 28 December 2020, Armenia released a souvenir sheet commemorating the 250th Anniversary of the Birth of **Ludwig van Beethoven**.

On 28 December 2020, Azerbaijan released a stamp commemorating the 250th Anniversary of the Birth of **Ludwig van Beethoven**.

On 28 December 2020, Nevis released a miniature sheet commemorating COVID-19: A Tribute to those on the Front Line, featuring the Rod of **Asclepius** in the selvage.

On 28 December 2020, Nevis released a miniature sheet and a souvenir sheet commemorating the 500th Anniversary of the Death of **Raphael**, including one stamp featuring Pope **Julius II**.

On 23 December 2020, Bulgaria released two stamps commemorating Famous Bulgarians, including one stamp featuring **Georgi Partsalev (1925-1989)**. He was born in Levski and studied medicine at Sofia University. He acted at the Satirical Theatre in Sofia before his first film role in *Lyubimets 13* in 1958. In 1964, he and 25 other men were put on trial on grounds of homosexuality, which led to the legalization of homosexuality in Bulgaria in 1968. He became a legend of Bulgarian comedy with film appearances into the 1970s.



On 22 December 2020, North Macedonia released a stamp commemorating the Bicentenary of the Birth of **Florence Nightingale**.

On 21 December 2020, Cuba released six stamps commemorating the Centenary of the Birth of Alicia Alonso, including one stamp featuring her in the premiere of *Theme and Variations* with music by **Pyotr Ilych Tchaikovsky**, one stamp featuring her in *Medea* with music by **Samuel Barber**, and one stamp featuring her in the premiere of the ballet, *Undertow*, with libretto by **Antony Tudor (1908-1987)**. He was born in London and discovered dance accidentally. He began dancing professionally in 1928 and began choreographing at age 23. In 1938, he founded the London Ballet with dancers that included Agnes de Mille and his future life partner, Hugh Laing. In 1940, he moved to New York and became resident choreographer with the Ballet Theater. He is generally accepted as one of the great originals of modern dance forms.

In 2016, he was made a Knight in the Legion of Honour. He died from complications due to COVID-19.




