PHILATUNES

One of the amazing things about our brains is that it associates our sensory perceptions with our memories. When I smell fresh-baked chocolate chip cookies, I am

transported back to my childhood and find myself in mom's kitchen at our home place. When I smell pipe smoke, I immediately remember my school friend's father sitting in his easy chair reading the evening newspaper and enjoying his pipe. When I hear my favorite music, I can't help but think of my stamp collection!

Say what? Yup, my stamp collection has a soundtrack! One of my habits in life is to put on some music when I sit down with my stamp albums. Those tunes and I have history together! They send me into a stamp collecting mood. Philatetunes!

I was blessed to grow up in the largest radio market in the USA, southern California. Two of my favorite radio stations to collect stamps by were Los Angeles originals that influenced the whole nation. They played music that my gay friends had introduced me to which wasn't previously played much on the radio.

One of those was 94.7 KTWV The Wave. It hit the airwaves in 1987 playing New Age, jazz fusion and soft vocals. Before yearend, at least a dozen Wave clones had popped up all over the US radio scene. They introduced me to so many of my lifetime favorites, including famous folk like David Benoit and Mannheim Steamroller, and lesser-known folk like classically trained sacred composer Fernando Ortega and the many artists in the Windham Hill label family.



Each year, KTWV released a compilation disc of listeners' favorites called WAVE Aid, which was a fundraiser for amfAR, The Foundation for AIDS Research. I'm glad they did that, because as is always the case when corporate entertainment buys up original new format radio stations, The Wave shifted in the early 90's to what they coined "smooth jazz," a tamer mix of contemporary jazz, soft R&B, and crossover hits. Today the smooth jazz pioneer is unrecognizable with its urban adult contemporary mix.

Another favorite of mine had an even shorter lifespan on the airwaves. In May of 1991, a Santa Monica station and Newport Beach station that shared 103.1 on the dial demonstrated the first successful radio simulcast known as MARS FM. Led by refugees from the legendary 1980's KROQ after it mainstreamed its playlists, MARS FM was made in heaven for the gay community in so Cal!

It was the first station ever to feature techno, house, and rave (or "electronic and alternative" format) in regular rotation along with new rock and party jams. 24/7 dance music! They would play comments from listeners between cuts. My favorite listener request was, I'd like to hear something GAY!" Listeners called in to protest when they slipped the

They are in the early stages of planning and would consider including activities throughout the month of June.

They are looking for potential in-person presenters who reside in the greater Boston region, virtual presenters and philatelic items to display from GLHS members willing to loan items to the museum.

There will be an installment of exhibit frames, and the museum could curate an exhibit with philatelic items received on loan. If any of our members have an existing LGBTQ exhibit that could be shown they would be interested in that as well. Some of our members plan to create onepage exhibits to be shown (if interested in participating, email glhstamps2@gmail.com.)

During the meeting the following members offered to assist:

- Lisa Foster volunteered to give a virtual talk on GLHS history and the organization today.
- Ian Gibson Smith volunteered to give an inperson presentation on FDCs and LGBT Postal History
- John Stefanek and Carol Costa will assemble a couple of pages of an exhibit of postage stamps of historical American LGBT individuals who viewers may not know are LGBTQ



Gay Ventures A Philatelic Column - Larry Crain



The title of this column comes from an album by Stanley Gibbons (shown as a graphic on the right).

My copy is the fifth edition, 1959. I find it an excellent small (96 pages) album. An

introduction gives helpful, concise instruction on soaking, handling and mounting stamps

I bought it with ~ 100 stamps inside. The following is a survey of the stamps and a comment about the album's organization.



The stamp with the highest catalog value, I think, is from Great Britain. Pages have a quadrille design with a few stamps illustrated on the top. This avoids the frustration of not having the stamp shown but having another with a different size which doesn't fit in the square provided. On the inside cover the album states, "We think it best to give you a graph as a guide; ... you can arrange your stamps much more attractively . . . Take pride in the arrangement of your stamps."

Some pages are set for a few countries; some for one. There are three for Great Britain and sub-divisions. France and colonies have eight pages, but Great Britain colonies are given full country status. The album's introduction expresses, "The countries of which you are more likely to get the most stamps have the most space."

The top of each page lists the countries as well as sub-divisions of that country. An index of these sub-division, about 300 names long, is on the inside back cover. I find this an excellent inclusion.



With that help, this Kelantan stamp is on the appropriate page. However, even with a name/language identification table on the inside front cover, this Bulgaria stamp was on a different Cyrillic country's page.



The introduction says, "Nearly every country tells you about itself," as the French stamp marking the centenary of the inclusion of Nice shows. It also advises to collect only "postage stamps," but nowadays Cinderellas, as I think the Netherlands stamp must be, are also very collectible.



"Practically any topic you care to think of are represented on stamp designs." That is why we collect and, also, that is why we who collect are different from each other.



David: An Extraordinary Man Angels come in all forms.

As a member of the Central Florida Stamp Club for more than 20 years, I first encountered David A. at a meeting in the early summer of 2000. I recognized a kindred spirit immediately. David was still in the working world and devoted to his vocation of engineering. His attention to detail and desire to make something 'perfect' was extraordinary. As a stamp collector he was extremely focused on the desire/need to acquire material for his expanding collections. We often discussed his expected and completed purchases. He had an eye for what was better and ignored stuff that did not meet his standards.

David and I collaborated numerous times on farreaching projects that benefited the club in many ways. His major accomplishment was an Excel spreadsheet to calculate all the many nuances of handling a called/silent auction for the club. It was an intricate project that took many hours spread across months, to test and perfect. His knowledge of Excel macros was the key to making it all work. He also served as the webmaster for the club and maintained the website with daily/ weekly updates as required. All this work was done in the background. David never sought attention or acclaim - he just did the work and brushed off any acknowledgement of his contributions with a half-smile and wave of his hand. He was also responsible for publishing (on the website) a comprehensive history of the CFSC something that had never been done in the 80+ years of existence. Again, David's attention to detail and the organization of information was extraordinary. The documents he authored will long be the definitive history of the CFSC.

As the years passed, David and I became fast friends with the common bonds of our detailed

oriented vocations and our love for our avocation. David was always available for discussion or assistance, and I leaned on him for proof reading. For nearly 16 years, I served as the editor of the monthly newsletter for the CFSC. The newsletter started off as a single page and expanded over the years to as many as 10-12 pages for most issues. It was a labor of love for me – and I depended on David for proofing. David's dedication to proofing was beyond the norm – even performing his duties while on vacation!

One particular encounter with David, will always be foremost in my mind. In an effort to be humorous I used the phrase "Ya'll". You would have thought I committed a high crime. David responded with an arm long email with all the reasons that was not appropriate use of the English language. Sensing that there was simply no way to win this particular language battle I acquiesced and changed the wording as suggested. Sometimes you have to pick your battles in life. We had many discussions about religion (he was Methodist and a devoted member of the First Methodist Church of Orlando) and politics.

Those are subjects that we avoid at stamp club meetings as everyone has an opinion that differs. David and I had many a long conversation in person and on the phone. Our discussions were rational and often left me to think deeply of what we discussed. It became evident in those conversations that David was a friend to the G/L community - I just did not know the depth until recently.

Then the Pulse Nightclub massacre happened. This was personal for me not only as a gay male and a resident of the Orlando area, but also because it happened on my birthday in 2016. At the time, I did not know of David's involvement; it was only in recent months that I discovered his

kindness. I knew nothing of this involvement even though I saw David 2-3 times a month and often talked to him on the phone. Never a word was said.

David passed away suddenly on May 29 at home. I was asked to deliver a eulogy, which I did. During the remaining eulogies and at the gathering after the service I learned a lot more detail about David's involvement.

David and his wife Cheryl have been members of the church choir for many years. One of the casualties of Pulse Massacre was the mother of a gay male. She was there at Pulse with her son that night. The following is quoted directly from an email from Cheryl to me:

"At some point our choir was told that we might have to cross a picket line (Westboro Baptist Church from Topeka KS) to get into the church to sing for this funeral. That was where David and I crossed the line from 'we're not sure what to think' over to everyone is or should be equal and we shouldn't have to cross a picket line to get into our own church to help someone. As it turned out there was no picket line, but by that point we were all in. Our choir also sang for an ecumenical memorial service held at our church."

I continue to be involved as David's wife has asked for assistance in dispersing his collection into the philatelic ecosystem. With the approval of David's wife, a portion of the proceeds are to be donated to the Russell Home for Atypical Children (Edgewood FL) and the Trevor Project. Both are worthy causes that David would have heartly approved of.


I conclude by asking the question: "What is the measure of a man?" I can think of kind, focused, understanding and most importantly -- devoted to making things better. David ticked off all the boxes in my opinion. Rest in peace my dear friend, you are sorely missed.

When this column is published, I will be functioning with a more leisurely pace of life and being able to be a writer and collector again.]

Gay Stamps

The first series of stamp parodies were begun while sitting in the dullest class in college. Rather than listening to anything the instructor said as he droned on and on...(and on and on), I doodled and wrote letters. Adorning the envelopes with tiny images depicting some of the actions described within. Not only was the idea of illustrating something in such a small scale interesting to me, but also the integration of text within the design. Calligraphy and letterforms were, and are, an important part of my aesthetic.

It wasn't until much later that I revisited the stamp format in my creative endeavors. A series of gay stamps were commissioned for an annual Boston Gay Pride Event. These stamps were to be included on the envelopes of the press releases, important invitations, etc.

Inspiration came from many stamps of the past. One of my favorites was respelling the cozily-composed word LOVE on the Robert Indiana stamp, to the rather "graphic" word LUST. Others show a vibrator in place of the Graf Zeppelin, a set of genitalia in lieu of the trilon and perisphere. The NASA stamps of 20 years ago with their distinctive logo lettering, inspired a series of dark S&M stamps.



Humor does play an important part in all the art that I do. Though, I'd like to think that many of the stamps also make people think of the value in, and fun of, diversity.

The Spanish speaking world has used several postmarks and cancels to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the birth of Federico Garcia Lorca. Lorca was a Spanish poet and dramatist. It is assumed that he was killed during the Spanish Civil War due to his well known sympathies for the Republicans.

New Issues

On 29 November 2023, Russia released four

stamps commemorating the 200th Anniversary of the Stroganov Russian State Academy of Arts and Industry, including one stamp featuring a **Nikolai Gogol** Monument.



In November 2023, Egypt released a miniature sheet commemorating the Reopening of the Greco -Roman Museum, Alexandria, including one stamp featuring Emperor **Augustus** of Rome.

On 13 November 2023, France released a souvenir sheet commemorating the 200th Anniversary of the Birth of **Rosa Bonheur**.



On 8 November 2023, the Czech Republic released a stamp celebrating the Art of **Toyen (1902-1980)**. They were a Czech painter, drafter, and illustrator and a member of the surrealist movement. They studied decorative arts at UMPRUM (Academy of Arts, Architecture and De-

sign) in Prague and joined the avant-garde Devětsil group before moving to Paris. There, they founded an artistic alternative to Abstraction and Surrealism, dubbed Artificialism ("The identification of the painter with the poet."). Their work was often erotic and comic, addressing gender and sexuality in humorous and fantasy-erotic illustrations. Toyen expressed interest in lesbian sexuality along with other forms of sexual expression, and contemporaries asserted Toyen was attracted to women.

On 8 November 2023, French Polynesia released a souvenir sheet commemorating the 100th Anniversary of the Death of **Pierre Loti**.

On 2 November 2023, Germany released a stamp celebrating the Brandenburg Gate, built on the orders of **Frederick the Great**.

On 1 November 2023, New Zealand released six stamps and six souvenir sheets commemorating the 20th Anniversary of the Premiere of *The Lord* of the Rings: The Return of the King, including one stamp and one souvenir sheet featuring Gandalf, portrayed by **Ian McKellen**.

On 1 November 2023, Uruguay released a miniature sheet commemorating the 180th Anniversary of Diplomatic Relations with Chile, including one stamp featuring **Gabriela Mistral**.

On 27 October 2023, Serbia released a souvenir sheet commemorating the 100th Anniversary of the Proclamation of the Republic of Turkey, featuring **Mustafa Kemal Atatürk**.

On 24 October 2023, San Marino released a stamp celebrating Christmas, featuring work by **Sandro Botticelli**.

On 16 October 2023, Monaco released two stamps commemorating Films Shot in Monaco, including one stamp featuring **Marlene Dietrich** on a poster for *The Monte Carlo Story*.

On 10 October 2023, the United Nations (New York, Geneva, and Vienna) released three stamps commemorating World Mental Health Day, featuring art by **Sergio Baradat**.

On 3 October 2023, Australia released four stamps, a miniature sheet, and a booklet commemorating Disney 100 Years of Wonder, including two stamps featuring Ariel from Disney's *The Little Mermaid*, based on a short story by **Hans Christian Andersen**.

Lucía returned to Francoist Spain to write poetry of lesbian desire while living quietly for more than 30 years with her partner, América Barroso.

According to Robyn's memoir, their early relationship was sexual, and Robyn remained a close friend and employee until 2000. Her first two albums peaked at number one on the *Billboard* 200, and she would go on to sell over 220 million records worldwide. She is the only artist to have seven consecutive number-one singles. She won eight Grammy Awards, 16 *Billboard* Music Awards, two Emmy Awards, and 30 Guinness World Records.

He was among the first directors of photography to experiment heavily with the usage of bounce light as a soft light source. He helped create one of the most memorable images of 1980s cinema: the opening sequence of young male athletes pounding sand along a beach to the film's theme music by Vangelis from 1981's *Chariots of Fire*. In 1985, he won the Academy Award for Best Cinematography for *Out of Africa*. David was openly gay.
