




News from the Editor


Please note that the club mailing address has changed.

The Florida Forty Stamper

Michelangiolo di Lodovico Buonarroti-Simoni. Art has been profoundly influenced by this extraordinary man. Born on March 6, 1475, this genius graced this world with fruits of his imagination, that ranged from sculptures, to frescos, to whole buildings designed in a manner and scale never before undertaken. His death on February 18, 1564, just short of his 89th birthday, was truly the end of a life that enriched civilization.

Michelangelo, a native of Florence, Italy, had an early life that revolved around the study of art. At the age of 13, he was placed in the workshop of the painter, Domenico Ghirlandaio. Even though he was to become an accomplished painter in life, this was never what he considered to be his strength. At the age of

15, Michelangelo began to study at the sculpture school in the Medici family gardens. Sculpting was to become his passion in life as expressed by the many magnificent works to come later. Michelangelo's early life association with the Medici family would come back to haunt him in later life. This association with the Medici family, who provided two Popes during this time period (Leo X & Clement VII), would serve to forge a connection to the Throne of Rome. This connection would later be the basis for Michelangelo's work to please the reigning Pope. Much of Michelangelo's lifetime was spent fulfilling the desires and commissions of the sitting Pope. Many of the Popes during this time can be described as tyrants. Countless works of art commissioned during this time by the Popes, served to further their vision of art, to glorify and beautify the common world.

Michelangelo's true love was sculpture. He conceived of the figure as being "imprisoned" in the block of stone or marble. By removing the excess material, the form was then released. The two magnificent sculptures for which Michelangelo will forever be known are the "Pieta" and David. The "Pieta" was completed in 1500 and is housed in St Peter's in Rome. It is the only piece of his work he ever signed. The giant, muscular, nude youth of David, completed in 1504, is housed in the Academia of Florence. These pieces of work exude the true artistic genius of this man.



Much to Michelangelo's chagrin, Pope Julius II in 1505 recalled him to Rome for two commissions. The first commission dealt with the design and construction of the Tomb of Julius II. A serious shortage of Papal money brought this project to a halt, much to Michelangelo's displeasure. Instead he was instructed to move on to the second commission, one that he never wanted. It was to create frescoes for the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel. This difficult task was undertaken from 1508 to 1512, and completed only after many episodes of serious rancor between Pope Julius and Michelangelo. Even though Michelangelo never fancied himself as a painter, this work can only be called magnificent.

In 1546, Michelangelo was appointed as the chief architect of St. Peter's Basilica. This was his crowning

PAUL HENNEFELD'S "GAY HISTORY ON STAMPS" COLLECTION ON DISPLAY AT MONTCLAIR PUBLIC LIBRARY

October is 'Stamp Collecting Month' and October 11th is 'National Coming Out' day. To celebrate these two occasions, the Montclair Public Library has on display Paul Hennefeld's stamp collection 'Out Of The Closet' and other philatelic memorabilia that inspired the Montclair resident to search for notable gay and lesbian persons depicted on postage stamps of the world. Included in the display are the books, *Gay American History*, *Jonathan To Gide*, and *The Gay Book Of Days*. These three books were of great importance to the collector in comprising a list of gay and bisexual persons on stamps. Hennefeld published his list in 1982, and has continually updated it. 'Out Of The Closet' has been exhibited throughout the USA and has won numerous awards including 16 gold medals. Hennefeld says that it has been a great pleasure bringing gay history to a mostly conservative philatelic audience. To the novice most stamp collections aren't exciting, but at stamp shows where 'Out Of The Closet' has been exhibited, the collection always draws a crowd. Visit the Montclair Library on South Fullerton Avenue and enjoy the exhibit.

Paul Hennefeld is a long time resident of New Jersey. He was raised in Cliffside Park, Richfield Park, and Paterson. In 1952 [during the Korean conflict], he enlisted in the US Air Force, and made the Air Force his career. Paul and his life-time partner, Blair O'Dell, were the first Montclair couple to take advantage of the state of Vermont recognizing gay people to marry in a civil union ceremony. They were married in Vermont on July 6, 2001 and have been together 26 years.

achievement as an architect. His efforts shaped and influenced the inside at the main altar end of the structure, on the exterior design, and on the final form of the dome. Modern day visitors to St. Peter's Basilica are treated to an awesome sight of majestic beauty. Michelangelo's grasp of architectural form and function place him in a select class of visionaries.

There is little doubt that Michelangelo's love of the male form was his overriding concern in life. In the massive homoerotic figure of David, one can see the perfect lithe nude male youth, muscular and alert. In his frescos, one can see countless nude youths gracing the surroundings. The body of evidence, which is considerable, strongly suggests that Michelangelo was gay. There is well documented evidence that points to a number of men, that at one time or another, were in a close personal relationship with Michelangelo. The "white-wash" applied to this subject by historians, including Michelangelo's own grand-nephew, who published an edition of his poetry in which all the masculine pronouns had been changed to feminine pronouns, have only served to further cloud this perception. Furthermore, rather curiously in all his considerable correspondence, he never once even hinted at marrying. During his lifetime, Michelangelo was extraordinarily secretive, and burned all his drawings and personal papers before his death. What a tragic loss to history.

AIDS Checklist Update

An updated AIDS Checklist follows on the next five pages. I would like to thank Blair Henshaw, Phil Stager and Ulf Uland for their help in getting this list current. There seemed to be a lull in AIDS issues in late 1999 and early 2000. However, with the America Issue (UPAEP), approximately 15 countries in the Spanish speaking world have issued AIDS related stamps in the past year.

Previous checklists published in this journal separated AIDS related stamps and people with AIDS (PWA) into two different lists. Both lists have been combined into one checklist. The "Subject" column has been renamed "Notes" and includes additional information for some issues. Russian local issues are not listed since they are generally not included in the major stamp catalogues. (A listing of these stamps will be published in the March 2002 journal.)

There are a few stamps listed in either Michel or Yvert, but not in Scott. One of the stamps is from Gambia portraying Anthony Perkins. The only stamps listed in Scott on the day of issue are a set featuring baseball-related movies. Tanzania and Zaire are two other countries that have at least one stamp not listed in Scott. Does anyone have information on these stamps?

I hope that this helps. Any input or additional information will be greatly appreciated. Thanks!



Dag Hammarskjöld was honored by the United Nations on September 18, 2001, with a release of a stamp from each UN Office. All three stamps bear the same design. The New York stamp is a light blue, the Geneva stamp is a red-brown and the Vienna stamp is a light green.


Mexico issued a stamp on June 21, 2001, featuring Frida Kahlo. Though the Mexican and US stamps bear similar artwork, and were issued on the same day; they are not joint issues. Scott no. 2228.

Moldova issued a set of four stamps featuring famous women on April 28, 2001. Marlene Dietrich can be found on one of the stamps. Scott no. 373.

Sierra Leone issued a sheet of four stamps on June 18, 2001, featuring Marlene Dietrich. Scott no. 2461 (a-d).

United States issued a stamp to honor Frida Kahlo on June 21, 2001. A similar stamp was issued the same day by Mexico. The US stamp caused a slight flurry of criticism because of Kahlo's views. Scott no. 3509.

India issued a stamp on May 4, 2001, honoring Frederic Chopin. Scott no. 1890.


Costa Rica issued a set of two stamps for the America Issue in December of 2000. Fight against AIDS was the theme. Scott nos. 540-41.

Ecuador issued two stamps in 2000, for the fight against AIDS. These were part of the America Issue. Scott nos. 1557 (a-b).

Macedonia issued a mail tax stamp on December 1, 2000. It was obligatory on mail December 1-7. Scott no. RA110.

This pre-stamped envelope commemorates the Sixth International Congress on AIDS in Asia and the Pacific (ICAAP) which will be held at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre during October 2001.

ICAAP enables the sharing of experiences and knowledge, and helps focus public and media attention on the growing severity of the epidemic.

The theme for this congress is 'Breaking down barriers', because, the organisers say 'HIV demands from us all a unified response. No one person, government or scientist can do what needs to be done. They can only achieve real success when working with others. The barriers that stop us working together must fall.'

The design symbolises the breaking down of barriers and incorporates the red ribbon that is the international symbol of AIDS awareness.
